




CG Commandant Addresses DC ANSO Chapter

Snapshot in Hispanic-American Military History

Juan del Castillo, USCG First Hispanic-American Officer in the Coast Guard

Juan del Castillo enlisted in the Coast Guard in June 1942 after graduating from Manhattan College and, by mid-year, he had received appointment to Officer's Candidate School at the Coast Guard Academy. He was commissioned an ensign in December of 1942, becoming the first Hispanic American to receive an officer's commission. Mr. Castillo served on convoys in the Caribbean before receiving training at the Naval Communications School at Harvard University. The rest of the war saw him serving on board cutters in the North Pacific.

Castillo was released from active duty in 1946 and served in the Reserves for nearly forty years. During this time, he had a distinguished career with the U.S. Department of Agriculture and became famous for developing "CSM," a high-protein food substance used in disaster relief, famines and mass feeding operations.

Jorge Farragut —Father of Admiral David Farragut

Jorge Antonio Farragut-Mesquida (1755–1817) was a Spanish-Catalan by descent and was born on the island of Minorca, Spain. He went to sea at the early age of ten and learned the ways of the sea in the Mediterranean for the next seven years, including service with the Russian fleet during its victory over the Turks in the Black Sea in May 1770. He commanded a merchant ship trading in the Caribbean between Havana, Vera Cruz, and New Orleans when he heard that the thirteen American colonies had declared their independence from Great Britain. He harbored an ancestral hatred for that country, as the British had ruled Minorca until the year after his birth, and therefore decided to join the newly formed United States in their struggle against Great Britain.

Jorge Farragut participated in the American Revolution as a first lieutenant in the South Carolina Navy and as a privateer. He fought the British at Savannah, Georgia and in 1780 was captured during the battle of Charleston, South Carolina. He was released in a prisoner exchange and then joined guerrilla leader Francis Marion, better known as the "Swamp Fox", in fighting the British in the Carolinas. Farragut fought at the Battle of Cowpens and led a volunteer company of cavalry on raids in the rear of the Lord Cornwallis' army during its campaign in North Carolina. By the end of the Revolutionary War, he had risen to the rank of Major.

After the war, he returned to the sea but in 1790 he was called upon by the governor of the South Western Territory (later to become Tennessee) to fight the Cherokees and Creeks as a Major of the militia. He acquired hundreds of acres of land outside the Knoxville for his service in the Revolutionary War and for fighting Indians. It was there that Jorge Farragut married Elizabeth Shine and had two sons, one of them was David Glasgow Farragut – the future first admiral of the U.S. Navy. Jorge Farragut would later serve again in the Navy in 1807 as a sailing master of a gunboat out of New Orleans and throughout the War of 1812. He finished his long military career fighting the British under Andrew Jackson in the Battle of New Orleans in 1815. He passed away in 1817.

Jorge Farragut

Private First Class Hector A. Cafferata, Jr., USMCR (Ret.)

Medal of Honor Recipient

Recovering in a U.S. Naval Hospital from horrific wounds suffered during the epic fighting at the Chosin Reservoir, Private First Class Hector A. Cafferata, Jr., was visited by several lieutenants from his Marine unit, the 2d Battalion, 7th Marines. As they were leaving after their visit, they told the young Marine that it was "an honor and a privilege to have fought alongside of him." Private First Class Cafferata later reminisced that hearing their comments was his proudest moment in the Marine Corps.

The New York City native grew up in Boonton, New Jersey, where he attended high-school and played on the football team. He enlisted in the Marine Corps Reserve in 1948, and was a member of the 21st Reserve Infantry Battalion at Dover, New Jersey, until called to active duty on 6 September 1950. Given just two weeks of pre-combat training at Camp Pendleton, California, the young Marine embarked for Korea in October 1950, joining the 2d Battalion, 7th Marines. During the last weeks of November 1950, PFC Cafferata's unit was part of the historic fighting withdrawal of the First Marine Division from the Chosin Reservoir.

During the early morning hours of 28 November 1950, Cafferata's company position was suddenly and violently attacked near the Toktong Pass by an overwhelming number of Communist Chinese soldiers. All members of his fire team had become casualties in the initial assault, and as a result, PFC Cafferata was forced to temporarily fight alone with grenades and his own service weapon. Disregarding his own safety, Cafferata moved up and down the line of fire, frequently exposing himself to direct enemy fire, while killing at least 15 of the enemy and wounding many others. His actions forced the Chinese to briefly withdraw their attacking force, and this allowed Marine reinforcements to reach his exposed position. The following morning, while continuing his fight to keep the enemy from breaking through his position, a hostile grenade was thrown into a shallow gully filled with wounded Marines. Unhesitatingly, Cafferata jumped into the gully while exposed to heavy enemy fire, and tossed out the grenade. The grenade exploded as he hurled it forward of the gully, caused grievous injuries to his hand and arm. The young Marine's heroism saved his fellow Marines from the force of the blast. Ignoring the pain of his wounds, PFC Cafferata continued to fight heroically until a sniper's bullet forced his evacuation for further medical treatment.

His "stouthearted and indomitable" conduct during the fighting at the Toktong Pass and his "dauntless perseverance in the face of almost certain death" saved the lives of several fellow Marines. His wounds caused his retirement from the Marine Corps in September 1951. One year later, Private First Class Cafferata received the Medal of Honor from President Harry S. Truman during ceremonies at the White House.


Sound-Off –Who is your Hispanic-American hero or role model?
